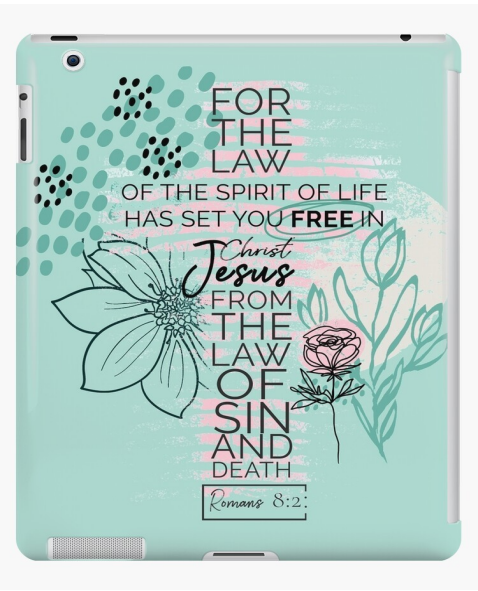

IT IS GOD WHO WORKS IN YOU

The Scriptures flatly call natural man in spiritual and divine things *darkness* (Ephesians 5: 8; Acts 26: 18). John 1: 5 says, "The light shines in the darkness" (that is , in the dark, blind world, which does not know or regard God), "and the darkness has not overcome it." Likewise, the Scriptures teach that a sinful person is not only weak and sick, but also finished and entirely dead (Ephesians 2: 1-5; Colossians 2: 13).

Now, a person who is physically dead cannot from his own powers prepare or make himself come back to life again. So the person who is spiritually dead in sins cannot by his own strength make or apply himself to acquire spiritual and heavenly righteousness and life. This is true unless he is delivered and brought to life by God's Son from the death of sin.

The Scriptures deny to the intellect, heart, and will of the natural man all readiness, skill, capacity, and ability to think, to understand, to be able to do, to begin, to will, to undertake, to act, to work, or to agree to work anything good and right in spiritual things from himself.

. . . "The natural person does not ac-

cept [or as the Greek word properly signifies, grasps not, comprehends not, accepts not] the things of the Spirit of God" (I Corinthians 2: 14). This means he is not capable of spiritual things. For they are foolishness to him; neither can he know them. Much less will he truly believe the Gospel or agree with it and regard it as truth.

For the mind that is set on the flesh [or the mind of the natural man] is hostile to God, for it does not submit to God's law; indeed, it cannot. (Romans 8: 7)

In a word, what God's Son says remains eternally true, "For apart from Me you can do nothing" [John 15: 5].

Paul says, "For it is God who works in you, both to will and to work for His good pleasure" [Philippians 2: 13].

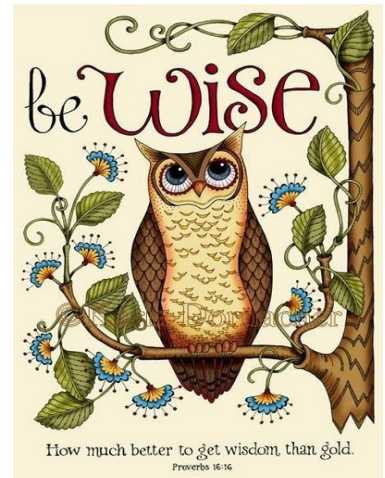

THE ORDER OF THE DIVINE SERVICE

The order of the Divine Service as we have received it historically is not the product of one person, one church body or synod, nor one ethnic background. It spans the entire history of the church and even has roots into the Old Testament. It has served the needs of the church to deliver the means of grace in a context of reverence, joy, catechesis, prayer, and repentance. Now, with this background in mind, we will examine the structure and order of the Divine Service as we know it.

SOME BASIC DISTINCTIONS

A. Propers vs. Ordinaries

- a. Propers** — are the variable elements of the Divine Service that are “proper” to the day or season in the liturgical calendar (e.g. Introit, Gradual, Readings, collect of the day, hymns, proper preface)
- b. Ordinaries** — are the regular parts of the liturgy that are “ordinarily” there (Kyrie, Gloria in Excelsis, Creed, Preface, Agnus Dei, Benediction, etc.)

B. *Beneficium* (Sacramental/Blessing Acts) vs. *Sacraficium* (Sacrificial Acts)

- a. Sacramental Acts** — Word and Sacrament elements that God is doing for us. The liturgist typically faces the congregation for Sacramental Acts. Typically Sacramental Acts are reserved for those men who are called and ordained pastors, or those men (like deacons) serving auxiliary to the pastor.
- b. Sacrificial Acts** — responses of repentance, prayer, thanksgiving, praise, that are prompted by the Sacramental Acts. The liturgist typically faces the altar or cross for Sacrificial Acts or may signify such with hands uplifted in a prayer or sacrificial position (extended from the shoulders outward or upward). Some sacrificial acts are part of the congregation’s response (Scripture responses or songs of praise, some are done or led by the pastor or liturgist as certain prayers, etc.)
