THE ECUMENICAL CREEDS: A BRIEF HISTORY

THE APOSTLES' CREED

The traditional title "Apostles' Creed" reflects the old legend that each of the twelve apostles contributed an article: twelve apostles, twelve articles (already in Ambrose, c.AD 350: "Symbolum of the Apostles"). Our Apostles' Creed in its present, authoritative form is first attested by Abot Pirminius of Reichenau (c. AD 753). How Pirminius received this form of the Creed is unknown, but it represents the final form of the Old Roman Creed whose history can be traced to the middle of the second century.

The earliest creedal form we know was very simple, containing only five articles: "in God the Father almighty; in Jesus Christ, our Savior; and in the Spirit, holy, the Paraclete; holy church; forgiveness of sins" (*Epistula Apostolorum*, c. AD 140). It is doubtful that a baptismal creed was ever this simple. Yet these five elements remain constant. Others were added through local circumstance or to oppose heresy. We may mention four:

- 1. Early creeds combined the Spirit and Mary under one action: "born from the Spirit and from Mary the Virgin." The addition of "conceived by the Holy Spirit" appears in the fourth century (Augustine).

 2. The consistent attribute of the Church is "holy." The word "catholic" (meaning "universal") was added in the fourth century to combat the Donatists, a North African sect which claimed that it alone was holy.
- 3. Opposition to Donatism is probably the reason behind the later addition of "communion of saints."
- 4. "The resurrection of the *flesh*," or less frequently "of the *dead*," was the most common way early on of expressing the wording. We now know it as the 'resurrection of the *body*."

The trinitarian form of the Apostles' Creed is evident: "I believe in God ...and in Jesus Christ...and in the Holy Spirit." The trinitarian structure is probably originally derived from, and certainly reflects, the commission of Jesus to His disciples (Matt 28: 19). Following the Gospel account, the Apostles' Creed and its antecedents were baptismal creeds, which in our sources may be found either as questions addressed to those being baptized or as declarative confessions of baptismal faith. Creeds used at baptism were local, and so this history of the Apostles' Creed is characterized by a multitude of baptismal creeds, which often vary in number and content of the individual articles. (see page 2) Only as the Church demanded conformity in its central liturgical forms did these variations give way to a standard text such as that evidenced by Pirminius.

Baptismal creeds were also popular for daily devotion. A creed close to that of Pirminius is found in the *Psalter of Aethelstan* (ninth century). The Creed was originally recited in the hourly offices, and during the Reformation it was incorporated into the Divine Service. Obviously it served well also in catechisms, as we see in those of Martin Luther. (to be continued)
