WE CONFESS: THE BIG THREE

Historically, the Christian Church has recognized three Ecumenical Creeds: the Apostles' Creed, the Nicene Creed, and the Athanasian Creed. Creed is from the Latin word *credo*, "I believe"; a summary of what the Church believes. An ecumenical creed is a creed that is accepted by the Christian Church *as a whole*. In other words, it doesn't matter if you are Lutheran, Roman Catholic, Methodist, or Presbyterian. If you are a Christian, you can joyfully confess the Ecumenical Creeds.

APOSTLES' CREED

The Apostles' Creed is the shortest and simplest of the "big three" creeds, and finds its origin in the writings of the first— and second-century Church Fathers. For instance, Ignatius of Antioch writes this around AD 107:

"Be deaf, therefore, whenever anyone speaks to you apart from Jesus Christ, who is of the stock of David, who is of Mary, who was truly born, ate and drank, was truly persecuted under Pontius Pilate, was truly crucified and died in the sight of beings of heaven, of earth and the underworld, who was also truly raised from the dead." (John Leith, *Creeds of the Churches*, 3rd ed. [Louisville: John Knox Press, 1982], 16-17.)

These words are an almost verbatim repetition of what Christians around the world confess even today in the Second Article of the Apostles' Creed. Thus, the Apostles' Creed is nearly as ancient as the Church itself.

NICENE CREED

The origins of the Nicene Creed go back to AD 325 during the Church's Council of Nicea. It was during this period that Arius attacked the teaching that the Father and Son were both coeternally and coequally God. Hence, the Nicene Creed confesses that Christ is "God of God, Light of Light, very God of very God . . . being of one substance with the Father" (*LSB*, p. 158). This creed, then, is largely devoted to defending Christ's divinity.

ATHANASIAN CREED

The longest of the "big three" creeds is the Athanasian Creed, containing some 656 words. Although its composition is traditionally attributed to Athanasius, who lived in Alexandria in the fourth century, its author is technically anonymous. Nevertheless, this creed carefully addresses and defends the doctrine of the Trinity in a highly technical and in-depth way. (see page 2)

BACK TO THE BASICS

In the sixteenth century, as Martin Luther led a reformation of the Christian Church, he took painstaking precautions to assure others that he had no aspirations of starting a new religion or sect. Rather, he maintained, he was simply seeking to return the Church to its orthodox roots. This is why the Augsburg Confession, a statement of what Lutherans believe, opens: "Our churches teach with common consent that the decree of the Council of Nicea about the unity of the divine essence and the three persons is true. . . God is one divine essence" (AC 11, 2). In order to make its case that Lutherans are part of the universal Christian Church, the Augsburg Confession appeals to the universal Christian creeds. The reformers are thus arguing that they are only teaching what has always been taught in the creeds. They are simply going "back to the basics" of credal Christianity.

Martin Luther himself used the Apostles' Creed as a "back to the basics" teaching tool when he wrote his Small Catechism. He begins his comments on this creed by explaining, "[This is how] the head of the family should teach it in a simple way to his household" (SC, The Creed). Luther believed that every Christian should know the creeds because they contain elementary and vital teachings of the Christian faith.
