TO COEXIST OR NOT

by Rev. Anthony Oliphant Go for a drive, and it won't take you very long to see a bumper sticker with letters made out of symbols from the world's religions that read "COEXIST." What's that

about? For most people, to coexist means to let everyone believe what they want and leave each other alone. What these bumper stickers are claiming to promote is peace between people of different religions. So, what's the problem? Isn't it good to want peace between people, no matter what their religions are?

As Christians, we do want to live in peace with our neighbors. St. Paul encourages us to do this: "If possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all" (Romans12:18). But we also have to recognize a big problem behind the coexist bumper stickers. They make a bigger claim than to simply live peaceably with each other. Behind them is the idea that no matter what religion someone belongs to, no matter what they believe, everyone will go to heaven. But if we're to live peaceably with all, does that mean that we must recognize that all religions believe what we do? The answer is no.

One of the defining characteristics of our Lutheran teaching is Law and Gospel. We can find the Law in a lot of places — nature, the Bible, even in our hearts — but all it does is accuse us. The Law shows us what we've done wrong and that God is displeased with it. Almost every religion recognizes this, but it's also where almost every religion goes wrong. They try to win God's favor with that same Law by doing things they think will please Him so that He'll reward them in this life or the next. When these religions attempt this, one of two things happens. People fall into hopeless despair or they trick themselves into thinking that it's worked. "Their conflicting thoughts accuse or even excuse them" (Romans 2: 15).

The Gospel is where Lutherans are unique. Rather than trying to win something from God by doing things for Him, we recognize that God has already done everything necessary to bring us back to Him. It's not a 50/50 deal where we come part of the way and God does the rest. God goes 100 percent of the way to get us back. He sent His Son to die for our sins, to pay for all of the things that the Law says displease Him. He raised His Son from the dead to promise us eternal life. Being Lutheran means that we're not a religion of the Law. Instead, we're a religion of the Gospel. We believe "the righteousness of God has been manifested apart from the law . . . the righteousness of God through faith in Jesus Christ for all who believe" (Romans 3: 21a, 22a). This is what makes us unique among all the religions of the world.

As Lutherans who teach both Law and Gospel, we can offer a lot more than simply coexisting with our neighbors. We can offer them dialogue and explanation. When we're rooted in Law and Gospel, it gives us steady ground to talk to people of different beliefs. We can set people free from their illusions or the despair that comes from living under the Law. We can speak with confidence, grace, humility and patience with those around us about the only way that we're released from guilt and shame: the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ. When we know about Law and Gospel, we can do much more than coexist with our neighbor. We can love them by gently leading them to the truth


UPCOMING FAMILY PARK DATES

Since Covid, Good Shepherd has made the change that every Sunday and Wednesday service would be a communion service. This has been a great blessing to our congregation, allowing us to receive the Sacrament of the Altar for "forgiveness of sins, life and salvation." Our long-term plan is to continue to receive the Sacrament of the Altar every Sunday and Wednesday service.

Since that change took place 3 years ago, we have had some who have missed singing the daily prayer offices like Matins and Vespers. After some consultation with the Board of Elders, we are happy to announce an opportunity for a weekly Matins service beginning in early September.

Beginning September 7 at 12:30 we will hold a Matins service immediately before the beginning of our Thursday Bible study. The Matins service will be in the church sanctuary and the Bible study will still be held in the fellowship hall. The entire congregation is invited to one or both weekly events.

During our Matins services each week, our Office Hymn will be the Hymn of the Month, and we will preach through the Gospel of John. In this way, we will be offering an additional opportunity to hear God's Word and to work toward memorizing the Hymn of the Month. These homilies will be audio recorded and used as a part of our daily devotion cycle.

Speaking of that cycle, we will also be paring down our daily devotions. Rather than providing daily video devotions 5 times a week, we will be providing them only 3 days. Monday will be Pastor Moline; Friday will be Pastor Goodroad. Thursdays will be the homily from the Matins service.

This will provide an opportunity for God's Word from Good Shepherd on 5 of 7 days in the week. Sunday and Wednesday Divine Services, Monday and Friday video devotions, and Thursday Matins. We are talking through the possibility of holding a brief daily prayer service on Tuesdays, but we haven't worked out the details as of yet.

We invite you to make use of these opportunities to hear God's Word and to receive His gifts. There is nothing more important in the world than hearing God's Word, by which the Holy Spirit calls, gathers, enlightens and sanctifies us in the Christian faith.
