FORGIVING YOURSELF: DON"T BOTHER

by Rev. Aaron Schian "Your Honor, I forgive myself!" Would a criminal ever stand before a judge in a court of law and announce such a thing? Of course not! When someone is accused of a crime, he stands before a judge and pleads either guilty or not guilty. He can't forgive himself because no criminal has broken his own law. The criminal has broken the law of the land and stands before a judge who will declare the punishment for his crime, a punishment he deserves. It's not his own forgiveness the criminal needs: it's forgiveness from the judge. The judge alone has the authority to forgive him, that is, to release the criminal from his punishment and set him free.

We, too, stand before a judge — the holy and righteous Judge, the Lord God — as criminals because we have sinned. "For all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God" (Rom. 3: 23). We have broken our Lord's holy ten commands, and now we must each pay the price for our crime. "For the wages of sin is death" (Rom. 6: 23). The punishment we deserve for our sin is eternal death. We are the offenders, and we stand before the Lord Jesus, who is both the offended party and our holy Judge.

Before our Lord, we stand guilty: we have sinned against Him. We learn this from King David. After King David committed adultery with Bathsheba and murdered Bathsheba's husband, Uriah, the Hittite, King David prays: "Against you, you only, have I sinned and done what is evil in your sight, so that you may be justified in your words and blameless in your judgment" (Psalm 51: 4). King David's sin was not against himself. He sinned against God, breaking the Lord's holy Law. King David was the offender, and the Lord was both the offended party and his Judge.

So, what did King David do? He did not say, "Your Honor, I forgive myself!" No, he stood before the Judge, confessed his sin to Him and sought forgiveness: "Have mercy on me, O God, according to your steadfast love; according to your abundant mercy blot out my transgressions. Wash me thoroughly from my iniquity, and cleanse mé from my sin." (Psalm 51: 1). David sought forgiveness from the Judge, who delivered the not guilty verdict to him through the prophet Nathan. "The Lord also has put away your sin; you shall not die" (II Samuel 12: 13). In other words, God's forgiveness — given out of His mercy — removes guilt.

But the Judge did the unexpected, taking the guilty verdict for us. On the cross, the innocent one, Jesus, took the place of every offender — including you — and endured the eternal-death punishment all men deserved. In its place, He gives to all men what they do not deserve and could never give themselves: forgiveness.

So it is with us. Every Sunday we stand before Judge Jesus, confess our sin to Him and seek His forgiveness. When we feel our sins particularly acutely, we go to our pastor for private confession, trusting that the forgiveness he speaks to us is God's forgiveness.

That is, we do not seek forgiveness in vain! We confess, and the Judge delivers a verdict that is sweet to our ears: "I forgive you all your sins in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit." With those absolution words, the Last-Day verdict is brought into the present. The Judge pronounces us "Not Guilty" because the Judge is also the Savior.

Can we forgive ourselves? Don't even try. To attempt that is to assume the place of the Judge, making yourself God. Instead, pull a King David. Seek the Lord's forgiveness, while it may be found. Come before Judge Jesus in His Church. Confess your sins to Him. He has already pronounced you "not guilty" from the cross, delivering that forgiveness to you through His means of grace. Prepare yourselves. Get ready. Your Lord is merciful, and you have already received the most unexpected sentence from Judge Jesus Himself: "I forgive you!"

LIFE MOMENT


