A PEDAGOGY LED BY THE WORD

The art and science of teaching are not new concepts. Some of the pedagogical approaches used today, such as the Socratic method, have their roots before Jesus walked on the earth. As Christians, we know that the command to teach comes from God:

Hear, O Israel: The LORD our God, the LORD is one. You shall love the LORD your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your might. And these words that I command you today shall be on your heart. You shall teach them diligently to your children, and shall talk of them when you sit in your house, and when you walk by the way, and when you lie down, and when you rise. (Deut. 6: 4-7, emphasis added)

This command to teach is for all of God's people. It's to Israel. It's to the church. It's to you, even if your official title is not "teacher."

So then, what is the purpose of this teaching? Is it purely an academic pursuit? Is the end goal of the instruction of God's revealed Word the same goal as the instruction of math, science, language arts or physical education?

To answer that, you must first ask yourself, "What is the goal when teaching each of these subjects?" On its own, the goal of teaching math is to memorize basic facts and learn how to apply them to simple and complex operations. Scientific instruction leads students to understand and observe how the world and things in the world function. The end goal of teaching is to help the learner gain knowledge. But teaching the Word, the teaching of Christ crucified for sinners, has one purpose:

But these are written so that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name. (John 20: 31)

Unlike math, there is no test to measure how much faith we have. Unlike science, there is no experiment to prove that we have faith. Unlike language arts, there is no grammatical convention to follow to have a correct faith. Unlike, physical education, there is no activity we can do to prove we can stay inside a target faith zone. The teaching of the faith, that is, the teaching of God's revealed Word, cannot be assessed. (see page 2)

The goal of teaching all that Christ has commanded us (Matt. 28: 20) is that those we teach might believe (John 20: 31).

Teaching all that Jesus has given us to speak flies in the face of conventional educational theory. Modern education theory wants evidence that you know what you have been taught. Jesus wants you to know Him. Modern educational theory praises grit and pull-yourself-up-by-your-bootstraps mentality. Jesus gives you His gifts. Modern educational theory moves on to new content once you have shown proficiency in previous material. Jesus invites you to return to His Word over and over.

. . . The purpose of teaching God's Word is to make disciples (Matt. 28: 20). And a disciple spends a lifetime learning the revealed Word of God. This Word of God is living and active (Heb. 4: 12). Luther put it this way in the Large Catechism:

The Word is so effective that whenever it is seriously contemplated, heard, and used, it is bound never to be without fruit. [Isaiah 55: 11: Mark 4: 20]. It always awakens new understanding, pleasure, and devoutness and produces a pure heart and pure thoughts [Philippians 4: 8].

So, what is teaching that is informed by the revealed Word of God? It is teaching that trusts that God will do what He promises to do. It trusts that the Word will deliver faith to those who hear it.

Dear Christian, know that this Word is not only for those you teach but for you too. So teach the Scriptures. Learn them. Commit them to memory. Go receive God's gifts that are for you! Continue doing these things, trusting that God's Word will do what it says it will do:

So shall my word be that goes out from my mouth: it shall not return to me empty, but it shall accomplish that which I purpose, and shall succeed in the thing for which I sent it. (Is. 55: 11)


