"I BELIEVE"

The English word "creed" has its roots in the Latin word credo, which means "I believe." In the language of the Church, a creed is a statement of belief.

The Book of Concord includes the three great creeds of the Church — the Apostles', Nicene, and Athanasian. The inclusion of these ancient statements of belief establishes that Lutherans embrace the orthodox faith of the Church.

The oldest creed is the Apostles', which developed from a number of brief statements in the New Testament. The statements were used in public preaching, Baptism, catechetical instruction, and worship long before being assembled into a creedal document.

The Nicene Creed is more accurately called the Niceno—Constantinopolitan Creed. This term was first used in the 17th century with a view to fixing the key dates in the development of the creed.

The Roman emperor Constantine convened the Council of Nicea, which formulated the creed, in AD 325. The text we now have is a revision made at the Council of Constantinople in 381.

The Athanasian Creed is the longest of the ancient creeds. Many of us know it from the custom of using this creed at the Festival of the Holy Trinity.

The origins of the Athanasian Creed are obscure. It was probably written in southern Gaul (France) during the late fifth or early sixth centuries. We do not know the name of the author.

Together, the three "ecumenical" creeds constitute the statements of faith widely confessed by Christians of many denominations.

THE APOSTLES' CREED

The apostles did not write the creed that bears their name. It developed long after their deaths, passing through several stages and gradually growing into its present form. It is called the "Apostles' Creed" because it sets forth the central beliefs of the apostles.

According to Dr. Robert Kolb, the text of the Apostles' Creed took its present shape in the eighth century. It represented a final revision of the old Roman (see page 2)

Creed, which was first used in the West in the early third century.

The text of the Apostles' Creed can hardly be attributed to a single author. Equally, no council or group of individuals has been identified with its authorship.

The creed was first a baptismal confession. Later it became a declaration of faith in Christ — "Jesus is the Son of God." It also became an apology, a defense of faith in Christ. Later stages saw it refute heretical notions and serve as a tool for Christological teaching.

The First Article of the creed describes God the Father as almighty, the Maker, Provider, and Sustainer of all things.

The Second Article describes Jesus Christ as the incarnate Son of God, conceived by the Holy Spirit. He suffered, died, was buried, rose from the dead on the third day, and ascended into heaven.

The Third Article describes the Holy Spirit, the state of the Church as holy, the forgiveness of sins, the resurrection of all believers, and the gift of everlasting life through Christ's righteous suffering.

The Apostles' Creed is of great significance because it confers to us the idea of one God manifested in three different Persons — the Trinity. To Lutherans, the creed is a true apostolic confession, teaching, and belief. It gives us the knowledge of creation, redemption, sanctification, and the gift of eternal life. (to be continued)


