HOW DO I KNOW I'M FORGIVEN IF I DON'T FEEL FORGIVEN? by Rev. Todd Peperkorn

Knowing and feeling are two different things, and neither one is faith. Knowing involves the head and how we think, while feeling involves the heart and how we perceive the world within and around us. Faith means trusting or relying on Jesus Christ.

When it comes to forgiveness, God forgives our sins for Jesus' sake, because of His work in dying and rising from the dead to atone for our sins. Jesus won forgiveness on the cross, and He now gives that freely to you and me as a gift. It is not simply knowing the right things or feeling the right way. Forgiveness is a reality given by God through His sacramental Word.

Easy to say; hard to believe sometimes though, isn't it?

As the saying goes, the devil is in the details. And the devil loves to cause us to doubt both God's Word and God's intentions toward us. If he can convince me that I do not know something, then I will doubt everything that is before me. If he can convince me that my feelings shape reality with God, then he can wage war against me using my emotions as his weapon.

God's Word provides a different picture. We read in John's Gospel, "And when he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, 'Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you withhold forgiveness from any, it is withheld" (JOHN 20:22-23). Notice that Jesus says the apostles actually forgive sins. It is not a reminder. It is not simply assurance. God authorizes them to release — forgive — sins. That's the gift.

Because God gives this forgiveness to us by His Son through the church, we receive this reality by faith, even if we may not always feel it. God remains steadfast, regardless of our fickle hearts: "My flesh and my heart may fail, but God is the strength of my heart and my portion forever" (PSALM 73:26).

All of us have times when we doubt. All of us have times when we feel as though God hates us or that we are not loved or worthy. In such moments, flee to God's Word and Sacraments. This is where we hear the Gospel. This is where God draws us back to our Baptism and gives us His own Son for the forgiveness of sins in the meal. And this reality is greater than our hearts or minds:

By this we shall know that we are of the truth and reassure our heart before him; for whenever our heart condemns us, God is greater than our heart, and he knows everything. (I JOHN 3: 19-20).
