LIFT UP THEIR VOICES

One of my fondest childhood memories was sitting with my grandmother singing hymns at the piano.. We sang from her white leather edition of *The Lutheran Hymnal*, which she had received as a wedding gift. As a child, I *really* wanted a hymnal of my own just like my grandmother, so one Saturday morning I decided to make that hymnal my own with a green marker. I printed my name — STEPHEN — in big green letters across the cover. While my nana was understandably upset, what I remember most is that she used that *TLH* for the rest of her life, often sitting next to me in the pew and choir loft. My grandmother cultivated a love of singing in church and a love for singing the Church's song. This was a song that transcended generations and gave me words to confess the faith, as well as beautiful poetry to proclaim praise to God.

Here are a few ways to cultivate an appreciation for hymnody in Sunday School, in church or at home:

1. **Use the hymnal whenever you can.** My grandmother and my parents shared the hymnal with me when I was young. Their fingers followed the text as we sang. In my children's choir, the older choristers are trained to help the younger ones throughout the service. Children thrive on routine and they absorb more than we might expect. In fact, they can make their way through the hymnal fairly independently by about eight years old. Along with the Bible and the catechism, you want the hymnal to be essential to children for life.

Teach children to use Lutheran Service Book, along with their Bible, for their prayers. Prayers can be as simple as the Daily Prayer section of LSB (294-98). When time permits, use one of the morning or evening services (p. 219ff.,229ff., 235ff. or 243ff.). An easy approach is to read the liturgy aloud and sing the hymn. God speaks to you and to your children through these words. When you teach a child that liturgy and hymns are actually part of their prayers life, their prayers will grow beyond a "to-do list" for God to do for them. They come to understand that in prayer and worship, God first speaks to them through His Word and then they speak back with praise.

3. Repeat the hymns from Sunday throughout the week. This will help children to more easily learn hymns by heart, especially if you select certain stanzas to memorize together. The benefit is that repeating Sunday's hymns throughout the week makes a connection between your daily prayer life and the Sunday Divine Service. When you sing together at home, both hymns and parts of the liturgy, children experience worship as an "everyday" aspect of life, rather than something done only once a week in the church building.

4. When teaching a hymn, ask children to echo you phrase by phrase. This is a valuable aural skill, much like learning the alphabet by reciting a smaller (see page 2)

group of letters at a time. It's often easiest for younger children to echo a female voice, because young children sing in the treble range themselves. (Over time they'll be able to echo melodies sung by a man's voice, but it's more difficult initially because the man is singing in a lower range.) For younger children, start with hymns that have a relatively small range, ideally within an octave.

Sometimes I hear adults say, "This is too hard for the children: they are not going to get it." My experience has been that there is nothing in the hymnal that is too hard for them. Children are always willing to tackle the music. And if they don't fully understand all of the text yet, that's okay. They will continue to grow in faith and understanding, just as we do. As their life experiences expand, they'll understand the hymns they've learned in new and deeper ways as well.

As a pastor, it all comes full circle for me when I visit shut-ins who have grown up with their hymnal. Some were bedridden or had trouble hearing or seeing. With some, it was difficult to even carry on a conversation. But whenever I would sing the liturgy or some favorite hymns, they were with me. We were in the same place together: **church** was right at their bedside. The hymns and liturgy they had learned by heart as children were now the key to pastoral care. It is beautiful to see God's grace working in this way.

The only "secret" is to start now, and then keep on singing. Children are sponges, but only for a short time period. Use the time you have today to give your children these treasures that will benefit them for a lifetime.



CONCORDIA'S WIND SYMPHONY

Concordia's Wind Symphony will perform their home concert on Saturday, April 20th at 7 pm at Messiah Lutheran Church and School in Lincoln, Nebraska after returning from their six-day long spring tour, during which they will travel to and perform at several churches and schools in Iowa, Missouri, and Illinois.

The concert will feature selections from the group's tour program and feature composers like David Maslanka, Alfred Reed, and Frank Ticheli, representing a wide variety of styles and genres from across the musical spectrum. The ensemble will also perform Benjamin Culli's "Bless the Lord, O My Soul", a piece commissioned for the Wind Symphony and debuted at their first tour concert.

The Wind Symphony has a rich performance and touring history that extends more than 100 years into the past. It is currently directed by Professor Robert Cody, a Concordia alum and recent addition to the music faculty. Cody graduated from Concordia in 2014 with a degree in K-12 music education and served as the Director of Music at Living Word Lutheran High School in Frankenmuth, Michigan, before returning to his alma mater.

Our own Sarah Stepp is a member of the group and will be playing the flute.
