THREE IN ONE

"PRIEST" VS. "PRIEST" ACCORDING TO THE NEW TESTAMENT Vicar Jacob Garrison

I Peter 2: 9 says that all Christians belong to a "royal priesthood." Does this mean all Christians can consecrate communion, preach publicly, absolve sins, and are responsible for overseeing everyone else? There has been some confusion in the last 30 years or so concerning who is and isn't given the right to carry out the Office of Holy Ministry within the church (see the Small Catechism "Confession"). It is likely that you have seen different practices even within different LCMS churches. Some of the confusion has come from a vocabulary misunderstanding about the word "priest" and its use in I Peter 2: 5-9. With a look at the text of the New Testament, this part of the confusion can be cleared up.

In the New Testament there are various titles given to those in the Office of the Ministry. According to how you count, there are upwards of 15 different titles and terms used. Here's a short list: "overseer/bishop," "elder/presbyter," "minister/deacon," teacher/doctor," and "shepherd/pastor." (I Peter 5: 2, Titus 1:5, I Cor 3:5, Eph 4:11). While there are distinctions between these titles, they all indicate someone within the Office of the Ministry.

Ironically, out of the 15 possible titles or terms, "priest" (which means someone who makes sacrifices) is not used in the NT to refer to the Office of the Ministry. It was sometime in the first three centuries that the term "priest" (Greek and Latin iɛpɛuc/sacerdos) became the common title for those within the Office. This may have happened for a variety of reasons: perhaps due to pagan religious competition or due to its indication of someone consecrated for service to God. Whatever the reason, the term was adopted by the Church, and that's ok. The Church has a right to call ministers what they wish. The only problem is that it's created confusion concerning the role of ministers as well as who is in the Office of minister.

Once the term "priest" was adopted, it ended up becoming a replacement for the actual NT title "presbyter" (which means elder). In fact, the word "priest" first came into English from the Greek πρεσβυτερος and Latin "presbyter" when the New Testament word was first translated (you can even see how the words look the same between the three languages), and originally the word "priest" in English meant "elder." However, due to the Latin "presbyter" otherwise being replaced by the Greek "iɛρɛuς "and Latin "sacerdos" (which both mean someone who makes sacrifices), "priest" in English quickly lost the meaning of "elder," and took on the meaning of "someone who makes sacrifices." That's why our English New Testaments translate "presbyter" as "elder" instead of "priest" today. This is kind of confusing, but long story short is that there is a complicated history concerning the word "priest" in English. The word now indicates someone who makes sacrifices, which the New Testament does not use for those in the Office of Holy Ministry. (over)

When the title of "iɛpɛuc/Sacerdos/priest" does show up in the New Testament, it's in reference foremost to Jesus. In Hebrews 4: 15, Jesus is called our high priest. Jesus is the only priest needed in the New Testament, because His sacrifice is sufficient for the sins of all people. Those in the Office of the Ministry do not make sacrifice to God for this reason: instead, their job is to declare and distribute the benefits of Jesus' priestly work through Word and Sacrament. With Jesus understood as the high priest, the New Testament uses the title for us as well. Peter states that all Christians belong to a "royal priesthood" (I Peter 2: 9). We belong to this priesthood insofar as all of us can ask God for forgiveness and enter the holy of holies as priests on behalf of Christ's sacrifice. All Christians certainly are priests in this way. However, the title of "priest" here, as already noted, has nothing to do with the Office of the Ministry. So, while there is a "priesthood of all believers," this indicates our ability to receive forgiveness of sins, not our ability to consecrate communion, absolve sins, and publicly preach. Appealing to the "priesthood of all believers" in regard to carrying out the duties of the Ministry contradicts the New Testament understanding of the terms.

Satan will use whatever he can to obscure God's word, and in this instance, he has used various meanings, history, and uses of the word "priest" to undermine the Office. Even though the title "priest" is now used to refer to those within the Ministry, the New Testament never uses the word in that way. And so, duties of the Office of the Ministry only belong to those who have been examined, called, and ordained. This is crucial and should not be obscured because Jesus Himself instituted the Office of the Ministry as the means by which He will be with us unto the end of the age (John 20:21, Matt. 28: 18-20). When we need a sure word of forgiveness for particular sins, when we need God's truth preached clearly, when we need godly wisdom in our lives, and when we need the medicine of immortality found in the Sacrament, we should go to the pastors Jesus sends into our midst to receive these gifts from God.

LIFE MOMENT


